

THE CHILD SEX ABUSE CRISIS: OUR PARISH RESPONDS

SUNDAY, 22 SEPTEMBER 2019

The task force has planned another parish-wide gathering to follow up on last month's fruitful discussion of the church's sexual abuse scandal. Next Sunday, September 22nd after the 10:15 Mass, Katelyn White, a speaker from a local advocacy group will meet with parishioners in Mulligan Hall to address the topic, *Sexual Violence 101*, with the goal of educating us on this issue in our church and in our society at large.

We can explore such questions as:

- How do we define sexual assault?
- Why do victims frequently wait for years to disclose their experience?
- What are the rights of the accused person?
- How does the statute of limitations restrict prosecution?
- How should we respond if a friend or family member tells us about a troubling sexual experience?

MUSEUM OF AFRICAN AMERICAN CULTURE AND HISTORY PARISH PILGRIMAGE

August 2019

Since our return from the pilgrimage, we have been featuring reflections from some of the people who were on the trip. This is the fourth of six reflections. This column was written by Sabrina James.

My Experience in Washington DC



I was very nervous about going to Washington. I just started school, so I didn't want to miss out on any lessons or have to miss out on seeing my friends. However, I was excited about the opportunity to get out of Cleveland for a while. After a very long bus ride, we arrived to the Black History Museum. I did not know what to expect. When you get to the museum, you go straight to the bottom, and you have to work your way back up, there is no backing out now. The course started with slavery. I didn't think I was going to see much, just the stuff we saw in the books and history lessons at school. However, I saw more than I could ever imagine seeing in a textbook. I took many pictures, and my heart ached while watching the videos on the screens and seeing the artifacts and conditions these people went through. I was sad because I thought to myself, "Wow, there could be

somebody on this video or picture that I descend from. These enslaved people, could be my ancestors; my family."

While I felt sad at first, suddenly came a rush of pride and power. As we worked ourselves away from slavery, we moved into the times of segregation. My people were tired. We have been mistreated since as long as anyone could remember. Bruised, beaten, and killed for simply being black. For something you cannot change or hide. The course ended with the first black president, the only president in my eyes, Mr. Barack Obama and his wife, the beautiful first lady Michelle Obama. We started at the absolute bottom, with slavery and made our way up to having a black president.

While that is powerful enough right there, that is not where it stopped. There was more at the top for us. The second floor of the museum had pictures of black rap and hip hop stars such as The Fugees, Nas, Salt-N-Peppa and of course, the ever so handsome Tupac Shakur (sorry grandpa). There is also a genealogy section on the second floor, which is important because if you don't know where you come from, you don't know who you are. Family is the most important thing to me. My grandmother decided to do it, and I did the computer work for her (of course). It was amazing to see the names of people I am related to, dating all the way back to slavery. Yes, you read that right, we were able to trace our family all the way back to slavery. It brought my grandmother and I to tears.



While I felt upset that my relatives had to go through the hardships they went through just because they were black, I felt so very strong, empowered, and proud that they went through what they did and we are still here standing today. I felt so happy to be black, I wouldn't trade this for the world. This is where my strength comes from; my people. The next floor had the honorable black athletes, which was very inspiring to see. Some of the best athletes in the world have the same color as me. The last floor had the outfits and paraphernalia of black artists and actors. It was amazing to see the outfits of people I only see on television or listen to their music; of people my grandparents grew up listening and dancing to. I enjoy the music as well, as I grew up listening to the music

playing in the house or blasting through my headphones. It made me happy to see the tambourine of Prince, the pants of MC Hammer, and the outfits of Bootsy Collins, Jackson 5, Public Enemy, Whitney Houston, and most of all, seeing my grandma dance to Missy Elliot's "Get Ur Freak On" in front of everybody. Concluding, the setup of the museum is inspiring and empowering in itself. You start at the bottom, seeing slavery and segregation, and you end with seeing people that look like you be included, break records, and go above the standards people thought we could never even be capable of. The museum made me so much more proud to be a black woman. I know that I am capable of absolutely anything I want to do, and that I should never back down, give up, or feel intimidated by anyone or anything. If my people were able to do it back then, we can do anything we work together to do today.
