

MUSEUM OF AFRICAN AMERICAN CULTURE AND HISTORY PARISH PILGRIMAGE

August 2019

Since our return from the pilgrimage, we have been featuring reflections from some of the people who were on the trip. This is the fifth of six reflections. This column was written by Barbara Neal.



My husband and I journeyed to Washington, D.C. with the Holy Spirit Church family to visit the African American Museum. The bus ride was very comfortable and those in charge of the trip went above board to ensure that the ride was pleasant and comfortable. We offer

our deepest gratitude and thanks. The bus driver, in my opinion, went out of his way in regards to service. In view of the fact that I am handicapped and require a wheelchair; he always had it ready when I left the bus.

When we entered the museum on the first day I thought the sculptures in the main area were quite impressive. Steve and I thought we would start on the top floor and work our way down. Seeing Chuck Berry's Cadillac Eldorado takes you back; little guitar tunes start popping into your mind. Oh, and the outfits of those days, well, hard to believe that was cool and stylish but those were the days. But the Funkadelic and the Star Ship, well they were always in a class all their own. We pretty much covered the upper levels the first day.

It's day two in the museum and I told Steve let's start on the lower levels today. Once we figured out how to get to the lowest level we were quite taken by surprise. I mean I remember learning of the cruelty of the slave trade in school, but seeing the true tools, the pictures, and reading the words of that period are, to put it mildly, deeply disturbing. I looked at my husband and I am certain I saw tears welling up in his eyes. I found it difficult to comprehend the level of cruelty and suffering that was inflicted on a people. We were in the lowest level the entire second day. It was just breathtakingly disturbing.



The last day we visited the remaining lower levels bringing us up to more modern times. The riots and the assassination of Martin Luther King, the presidents of that time period and the legislation they

signed into law and how they were affecting the masses all this is put at eye level, one almost feels you are there. But we could not see everything. We had spent so much time on the lower level. Truly this trip was, for lack of better words, an experience to remember.
