

DID YOU KNOW THAT NOVEMBER IS BLACK CATHOLIC HISTORY MONTH?



In July 1990, the National Black Catholic Clergy Caucus of the United States voted to establish November as Black Catholic History Month, honoring the men and women from Africa who pioneered the faith. Many forget that Christianity did not begin in Europe. Black Catholics have had a huge impact on the history and traditions of Christianity. The month

of November was chosen because there are several dates in this month that are important to Catholics of African descent, such as the death and feast day of Saint Martin de Porres (November 3rd).

Shown is a photo of Fr. Augustus Tolton, whom a cause for canonization as a saint has been opened. Fr. Tolton was born into slavery in 1854 and escaped to freedom as a child among the chaos of the Civil War. He was the first African American Roman Catholic priest in the United States. In July 2019, Pope Francis determined that Fr. Tolton practiced heroic virtue, thus naming him to the title of The Venerable Father Augustus Tolton. The next phase of the canonization process is that a proposed miracle must be examined. We have included an insert in the bulletin this week with a number of black Catholic history facts. November Black Catholic History Facts

- Nov 1. Saints Julian and Basilissa used all their money to convert their home into a hospital which sometimes housed thousands. St. Basilissa tended the sick women in one part of the house and St. Julian in another part. Although they survived several persecutions and died separately in peace, the Church calls them martyrs.
- Nov 2. Among the popes between St. Peter and Pope Francis, three popes were African. St. Victor I was a deacon when he became pope in 189 A.D. and became a martyr in 199. St. Melchiades was the 2nd Black pope from 311 to 314. St. Gelasius I was pope from 492 to 496.
- Nov 3. The only saint of African origin in the Western Hemisphere to date, is St. Martin de Porres of Lima Peru. Born in 1579, he became a Dominican Bother, Founded an orphanage and a hospital. He ministered to hundreds of Africans who were forced into slavery. He is the Patron Saint of Peru and of the poor.
- Nov 4. St. Monica to Tagaste, Africa, spent most of her time praying for a wayward and worldly son, who eventually became one of the Church's greatest theologians, St. Augustine. She died in the year 387.
- Nov 5. Henriette Delille was the founder of the Sisters of the Holy Family based in New Orleans, Louisiana, and is among three Black candidates for sainthood in the Church. At age 17, she and two companions began to evangelize the large slave and free-people of-color populations in New Orleans.
- Nov 6. Simon of Cyrene, which is in Africa, carried the cross of Jesus in the Gospel according to Luke. In the Book of Acts, Apostle and Deacon Phillip helped convert an official from the Kingdom of Ethiopia to follow Jesus even before the conversion of St. Paul. This event is credited with changing the Church form a primarily a Hebrew and Greek community to a truly universal and catholic Church.
- Nov 7. St. Aganaum, an African, is the patron saint of southern Germany and parts of France, Spain, Italy and Switzerland. He became a general in the Roman army. St. Maurice and his 6,000 African soldiers were ordered to put down a rebellion, but he and his legion found out they were Christians, they refused to fight them. St Maurice and his soldiers were executed. Their relic remans are enshrined in a basilica in Switzerland.

Nov 8. Two young African Christian women and three companions were thrown to wild animals and killed for their faith in the year 207. St. Perpetua, a new mother, and her pregnant maid-servant Felicity, both refused to worship Roman gods. They were both beheaded.

Nov 9. St. Josephine Bakhita was kidnapped from her family in Sudan and sold into brutal slavery. Her different "owners" frequently beat and tortured her. At age 14, she was sold to an Italian diplomat. She received Christian instruction from the Sisters of Charity in Venice, Italy. When the diplomat returned to Africa, St. Bakhita refused to go and remained with the Sisters in the convent. St. Josephine Bakhita eventually joined the religious order and for the next 50 years, she joyfully served as the convent's cook, seamstress, sacristan and doorkeeper until her death in 1947. St. Josephine Bakhita was the first African woman to be canonized by the Church in the 21st century.

Nov 10. Pierre Toussaint who worked as a hairdresser in New York 200 years ago, is on track to become the first African American man to be canonized as a saint from the United States. He was born in Haiti when it was still a French colony. His owners fled with him to the United Stated to escape the slave rebellion in Haiti. He became a very successful hairdresser. When his slave-owner died, he quietly supported his owner's widow, who freed him from his slave status. He later married and used his considerable wealth to support charitable causes. Pope John Paul II declared Pierre Toussaint Venerable, the first step to becoming a saint.

November Black History Facts 2

- Nov 11. The first African American priest ordained in the United States was born in Baltimore MD. 150 years ago. Charles Randolph Uncles was the son of a railroad worker and seamstress. He broke the color barrier in Baltimore's St. Mary's Seminary at a time when segregation was the norm in the Catholic Church. Two years after his ordination, Fr. Uncles became one of the founders of the St. Joseph Society of the Sacred Heart, more commonly known as the Josephites, whose mission was to evangelize African Americans in the United States and elsewhere.
- Nov 12. The Oblate Sisters of Providence in Baltimore is the first and oldest religious congregation for women of color in the United States. Mother Mary Lange, a Haitian immigrant and educator, and three companions founded this order in 1829, when Maryland was still a slave state. Under great risk, they dedicated themselves so serving orphans and educating Black children. She also founded St. Francis Academy, which continues as a co-ed high school that educates inner city African American and Hispanic youth. Mother Lange's candidacy for sainthood began in 1990.
- Nov 13. One of the pillars of the Catholic Church, St. Augustine, wrote 96 books during his lifetime. His writings covered a huge range of subjects such as morals, history, philosophy and heresy. Pope Leo the Tenth admired St. Augustine so much that he allowed his feast to be honored the same as those of Christ's Apostles. His feast Day is today.
- Nov 14. Born of a rich and noble family of African descent in Spain, St. Peter Claver chose to spend his life serving he sick and downtrodden in South America. He treated people with leprosy and met all the slave ships on the docks in Colombia. He also served the neglected Native Indian people in Colombia. St. Peter Claver touched some 50 thousand African slaves. Over one hundred years

ago, the Catholic organization called the Knights of St. Peter Claver was founded in his memory.

Nov 15. St. Katherine Drexel was born into great wealth in Philadelphia, PA. Her parents taught her that their money was meant to be shared with others. In service to suffering Native and African Americans, she gave more than 21 million dollars of her own money to help found dozens of churches, schools and hospitals across the U.S., including Xavier University in New Orleans, LA. She also helped found Holy Redeemer Parish and school in Washing, DC. St. Katherine Drexel also founded her own religious congregation of the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament. She described herself as the mother and servant of the Indian and Negro races. St. Kathrine Drexel died in 1955 and became a saint in the year 2000.

Nov 16. The Healy brothers, James, Alexander and Patrick were born of a slave mother and fathered by a Georgia plantation owner. They were sent north for their education and freedom. Because of the racial climate in the 19th century, the Healy brothers had to be ordained in Europe. James Augustine Healy became the nation's first African American bishop in Portland, Main, in 1875. A year earlier, his brother Patrick Francis Healy, became the highly regarded president of the Catholic institution, Georgetown University. Ironically, Georgetown did not admit students of color until the mid-1900's.

Nov 17. Ss. Ursus and Victor were soldiers in the Theban Legion. They were captured at Solothurn in Switzerland and executed for their faith and buried outside the walls of the city. Theodoline, Queen of Burgundy, in 480, had the body of St. Victor brought to Geneva and built a basilica in his honor. She built a church over the tomb of St. Ursus of Solothurn.
