

BLACKS IN THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA BEFORE 1619

Juan Garrido was free African born in the Kingdom of Kongo, Mwisi Kongo or Kongolese and lived approximately from 1487 - 1550. He migrated to Portugal in his youth, converted to Catholicism, changed his name to Juan Garrido ("handsome John"), and became a Spanish conquistador. Juan joined Spanish expeditions, arriving in Santo Domingo (Hispaniola) in 1502; he participated in an invasion of Puerto Rico, and Cuba in 1508; he joined Ponce de León in the search for gold in Florida. He is the first known African to land in the North American continent. Eventually he joined with Cortes' forces who invaded Mexico before going on to marry and settle there. He was the first farmer known to sow and harvest wheat in the Americas and owned African and Native American slaves.

Esteban the Moor (Estevanico), also known as Esteban de Dorantes or Mustafa Azemmouri born in 1500 in Azemmour, Morocco, was the first African to explore North America. He was captured, enslaved and sold to a Spanish nobleman in Spain around 1521. He died in 1539 in Hawikuh, New Mexico. He explored Florida, and other unexplored lands north and west of Florida, including northern New Mexico. He has been called "the first great African man in America."

Pedro Menendez de Aviles established St. Augustin, Florida in 1565, and had free and enslaved Africans with him.

Spain had a different view of slavery than the rest of Europe. Their slaves were captured in "just wars" and enslavement was not based on race. Some sold themselves into slavery. The Spanish philosophy of "Siete Partidas" believes slavery is an unnatural condition, because God has created humans free; the philosophy established a means whereby enslaved people could become free.

This was carried over to Spanish Catholicism which speaks on the freedom of all people, slave or free, as brothers and sisters in Christ. The church and slave masters were expected to teach the rudiments of the faith wherein enslaved people might join the church and celebrate the sacraments. Since the sacrament of marriage means families could not be separated, enslaved persons were often tied to intricate kinship arrangements with owners behaving as godparents, and marriage sponsors.

Africans working with Menendez de Aviles worked on fortifications, sawed timber, built structures including churches, blacksmithing shops, and an artillery platform, and cleared land for planting. They were not free from racial prejudice either in Spain or in the New World. This didn't stop them from climbing the social ladder by marriage, accruing wealth, military service or through the sponsorship of a person of higher status.

There were many others of African descent, not able to be mentioned in this article, who were involved in the exploration of North America in the 15th and 16th centuries.

HOLY SPIRIT CHURCH MUSIC MINISTRY

For the last two years cantors have anchored our music ministry. It has not been safe for a group of people to gather in a choir, in close proximity, singing boldly and full-throatedly. We have used small scholas of cantors on occasion for the most solemn celebrations.

While so much uncertainty still surrounds us regarding the pandemic and how best to keep ourselves and each other safe as we are faced with variants, we are taxing the availability of the cantors willing to help lead our worship. So, this is a request to our cantors and choir: if you are feeling safe enough in church, will you take a turn being the sole vocal leader to help lead us in our sung prayer?

All you have to do is come to practice and agree to give your best effort while continuing to learn the art of leading a congregation in singing.

The future of our choir begins here.


