Mass with the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick



The Wednesday evening Mass on March 22nd will include the opportunity for those in attendance to celebrate the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick. The sacrament takes place after the homily and before the Liturgy of the Eucharist.

The sacrament is not only for

those who are in danger of imminent death and should not be thought of in that way. The sacrament may and should be given to anyone whose health is seriously impaired. The instruction on the sacrament offers these general guidelines for who rightly asks to receive the sacrament:

- those whose health is seriously impaired by sickness or old age;
- the sacrament may be repeated if the sick person recovers after being anointed and then again falls ill, or if during the same illness the person's condition becomes more serious;
- elderly people may be anointed if they have become notably weakened even though no serious illness is present;
- * sick children may be anointed if they have sufficient use of reason to be strengthened by this sacrament.

Celebrating the sacrament during Mass gives us the opportunity to collectively bring our weakness and ill health to God for blessing and healing. By the sacrament, we present ourselves and our loved ones to God, and we are strengthened by praying together for each other. Even if you are not in need of this sacrament at this time, come and pray with brothers and sisters here, who beg God's healing Spirit in their lives.

THE PENITENTIAL ACT

Almost every celebration of the Mass includes the Penitential Act, after the Processional Hymn, the Sign of the Cross and Greeting. It is part of disposing ourselves to participate fully in the great act of thanksgiving that the Eucharist is. The Penitential Act can be prayed in three ways, but at Holy Spirit Church we almost always use the third form. I have definite reasons for preferring to use that form, which I'd be happy to explain to anyone who is interested.

As happens in human behavior, when we never exercise an option, slowly our awareness that there is an option fades from consciousness. I realized this when Bishop Roger was here on Epiphany Sunday and chose the first form of the Penitential Act and many of us were caught off guard and unable to easily recite the prayer from memory, including myself.

Lent is a particularly appropriate time to use the first form with its clear focus on our admission that we are sinners in need of God's mercy and forgiveness, and that we need the prayerful support of our brothers and sisters to live as virtuously and faithfully as we can. To help us learn the prayer so that we can easily say it from our hearts, we will use the first form of the Penitential Act each of the first five Sundays of Lent. If you need to see the text in print, it is on page one of the missal at the end of the pews. And then later in the year, we'll use the second form for a period of time in order to make sure we can fully participate whenever a priest uses it at Mass.

MINISTERS OF THE EUCHARIST



Each week at the 10:30 Mass there will be a minister of the Eucharist assigned to distribute Communion to those seated in the side chairs on the Blessed Mother altar side of the church, and then to those through-

out the church unable to come forward in the Communion procession. With this practice, we're returning to what was customary for us in the pre-pandemic days.

For this reason, we'll be calling on more of our eucharistic ministers to return to service by helping to distribute Communion. If you're willing to be on the minister's schedule again, please leave a message at the parish office.

Then, beginning on Holy Thursday, the day we celebrate the great gift of the Eucharist to the church and the world, we'll begin offering the Eucharist under both forms in the Communion procession. That is, the possibility of receiving the Blood of Christ from the communion cup will be restored. If you are still reluctant about receiving Communion in that form, please remember that you are not required to.

We're going to give this a try in accord with the request of some for a return to the practice, and in respectful deference to the fullness of the symbol of his life that our Lord Jesus gave to us.

FRIDAYS OF LENT AND SAINT PATRICK DAY A Message from Bishop Malesic

"Throughout the season of Lent we are invited to participate in the opportunity for prayer, fasting and almsgiving in order to deepen our awareness and better appreciate the ultimate sacrifice Jesus made for us on Good Friday. This year, St. Patrick's Day falls on a Friday in Lent, and several have inquired about the possibility of a dispensation from the obligation to abstain from eating meat on Fridays in Lent.

"After prayerful consideration, I am granting this dispensation from the obligation to abstain from meat for those who feel it absolutely necessary to be dispensed in order to celebrate the Feast of St. Patrick. I ask that those who exercise this dispensation and eat meat on the Feast of St. Patrick to select another non-Friday day during Lent to abstain from eating meat or to make some offering on behalf of the poor, whether by prayer, fasting or almsgiving."

AN EVENING OF CONFESSION

On Wednesday evening this week, every church in the diocese is open from 5:00 - 8:00 pm for the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Our church will be open as usual at 5:00, and we will celebrate Mass as usual at 6:30. The Blessed Sacrament will be exposed on the main altar of the church up to Mass time. Whether you are coming for confession or not, you are welcome to stop by church for a little while for some private prayer and devotion before the Blessed Sacrament.

In accord with the circumstances of the day and liturgical guidelines, the exposition and reposition will take place silently and reverently, without hymns, incense or benediction.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Peace be with you! As Catholics, we are committed to protecting the sanctity of human life no matter the circumstances or stage of development. We live this out by, among other things, accompanying the poor and needy, refugees and immigrants, prisoners on death row, young mothers, and children.

In Ohio, the dignity of life in its earliest stages is threatened by groups proposing an amendment to Ohio's Constitution for the November 2023 ballot that would enshrine and expand abortion at the expense of protections for preborn children and women. The Church must not be silent and cannot remain on the sidelines when confronted with such a clear threat to human life. This proposal demands a response, and we strongly encourage Catholics and all people of good will in Ohio to work against including the proposed amendment for the November ballot and, if it appears on the ballot, vote against the amendment to prevent countless deaths of preborn, innocent children.

Our Holy Father Pope Francis reminds us that "Our defense of the innocent unborn ... needs to be clear, firm and passionate, for at stake is the dignity of a human life, which is always sacred and demands love for each person, regardless of his or her stage of development" (*Gaudete et Exsultate, no. 101*). Our commitment to protecting and promoting life includes providing resources and accompanying women during and after pregnancy through our numerous social service agencies, schools, and parishes. This commitment also includes rejecting abortion expansion, which only perpetuates a throwaway culture that does not value human life.

The Catholic Conference of Ohio will be collaborating with statewide organizations, and diocesan respect life offices will be seeking volunteers to help coordinate a campaign at every parish. More information and materials will become available as we mobilize to oppose the proposed amendment on the November 2023 ballot.

We, the Catholic Bishops of Ohio, stand with you, our faithful, in our commitment in the name of the Lord of Life, to each human person from conception to natural death. Let us unite in fasting and offering this prayer:

God our loving Father, grant wisdom to those who govern us, compassion and courage to those who work to defend human life, and safety and care to every human being. For you alone who formed us in our mothers' wombs, and who call us home to heaven, are God, for ever and ever. Amen.

THE SCRUTINIES

Last Sunday, during a ceremony at the cathedral, five youngsters among us officially became candidates for baptism in the Catholic Church. They are now counted among the *Elect* of the church – those chosen by God to become members of the Catholic Church at this year's Easter Vigil.

These few weeks of Lenten preparation contain some special rituals that we will incorporate in the 10:30 Mass on the three consecutive Sundays beginning March 12th (and two Wednesdays). From the early centuries of the church, these rituals have been called Scrutinies. They are meant to uncover, then to heal all that is weak, insufficient or sinful in the hearts of the *Elect*, and to bring out and strengthen all that is upright, strong and good.

The Scrutinies are celebrated in order to deliver the *Elect* and the rest of us from the power of sin and evil, to protect us against temptation, and to give us strength in Christ, who is the way, the truth, and the life. These rites deepen our community's resolve to hold fast to Jesus and to carry out our decision to love God above all.
